Woodthorpe Grange Park

Location

Access via: Woodthorpe Drive and Mansfield Road (pedestrian entrance only)



Route 1

Approx 1658 steps
1 ¼ km (Over ¾ mile)

Route 2

Approx 3300 steps
2 ½ km (Just under 1 ½ miles)

Route 1: Paved surface in good condition.

Route 2: Some paved surfaces, others are through grassed areas (which can get muddy)

The entrance to the car park is reached off Woodthorpe Drive. Disabled parking is provided

Most of the site is accessible to people in wheelchairs

No public toilet on site



Woodthorpe Grange Park

Points of interest:

- The land on which the park sits was bought by Nottingham City Council in 1921 for the sum of £15,000.
- The park was visited by King George V and Queen Mary on the 10th July 1928, as part of a tour of Nottingham. 17,000 school children travelled to the park to mark the event.
- Woodthorpe Grange Park has a rich diversity of specimen trees and woodland strips. There are over 1000 trees within the park.
- The park covers 20.28 hectares and is home to bats, woodpeckers, foxes and owls to name a few.
- The Grade Two listed building was built in 1874.
- The tropical house has plants from around the world on display including banana, lemon and coffee trees, as well as pomegranates and olives.
- Ashwells Tunnel, a former railway tunnel was sealed in 1978
